1 The Title

Use the Title1 style to format the title of the paper. Format the authors as follows:

One author: Name (using the Author style), on the next line: affiliation (using the Affil1 style).

Multiple authors, all with the same affiliation: names (using the Author style), on the next line: affiliation (using the Affil1 style).

Multiple authors, multiple affiliations: Names (using the Author style) with after each name in superscript a lowercase letter. On the next lines: one affiliation per line (using the Affil1 style for the first one and Affil2 for the others), each preceded by the appropriate letter in superscript followed by a space. See the title of this document.

2 The Abstract

After the authors' affiliations follows the text 'Abstract' formatted with the Abstract title style. The text of the abstract is formatted with the Abstract style.

3 Sections and Paragraphs

Section headings come in three levels: Heading 1, Heading 2, and Heading 3.

The running text is set with the Platte tekst inspringen (Retrait corps de texte) style. An exception is made for the first paragraph after a heading: it is set with the Body Text Noindent style. Do not leave extra space between paragraphs.
